Food Pantry - Our SVDP food pantry is open twice a month on the second and fourth Mondays. The food pantry will be open this Monday, May 10, from 3:00 to 4:30 pm. All individuals and families that are members of St. Mary Catholic Faith Community or non-members that live in our area are welcome to use the pantry. If you cannot make the time the pantry is open, SVDP keeps pre-packed bags of groceries in the Parish Office that can be picked up during office hours, Monday through Friday.

On our last pantry open date of April 27th, a large number of families came to the pantry for food. Although the pantry shelves were full when the pantry opened, they were empty by the end of the day. Thank goodness our St. Mary's parish members have been so generous with their food and money donations for the pantry. We have been able to restock the pantry shelves after each pantry day. However, to keep the pantry full during this time of high need by many, we ask St. Mary's parish members to continue their generous food donations. We are in immediate need of the following items for our pantry: cans of Spaghetti-0s, white granulated sugar, ketchup, yellow mustard, pickles, paper towels, toilet paper, liquid laundry detergent, dish soap, deodorant, coffee, feminine hygiene products, ladies/men's razors and large cans or jars of spaghetti sauce. Currently, we have plenty of the following items: soups, cold cereals, large oatmeal canisters and pasta. All other food items not listed above are also welcomed.

Help Beyond Food - If your family needs emergency help beyond food, SVDP may be able to help. Give us a call at 414-425-2174, ext. 210 and leave a message with your return phone number. A SVDP member will call you back and discuss your situation in total confidentiality. If help by SVDP is possible, a home visit by two members of SVDP will be set up.

BE THE COMPASSION OF CHRIST HANDS & HEARTS TOGETHER

From Port-au-Prince at Matthew 25 (by Pam Lownik):

After ten days living here at Matthew 25, I again have to share a mixed emotion of hope and despair. The school preparation is in full swing. The Haitian teachers have been picked and have agreed to volunteer their time for the next three weeks to help determine need within the camp (how many students, grade levels, schedule etc.) Classes are scheduled to start Thursday, May 6.

Yesterday I witnessed a young woman named Reginette, an amputee patient getting her new leg. I will never forget the look of amazement and joy on her face as she tentatively, and then more confidently, began to walk. The group of dedicated health professionals from Nepco in New Hampshire have eight patients they are following here. They shared that the estimated number of amputations that were done after the earthquake is 3,000. Currently 1,500 patients are being fitted for new limbs. Sadly the others did not survive.

Most of the tent camps are dealing with deteriorating conditions and combination of heat and mud from the on-and-off rainstorms followed by hot sunny days. I am joining a group of human rights observers who are heading down to a camp that is being relocated. Many Haitians are living in a variety of tent camps. Most are built on public property, soccer fields, school yards - really any green space has become a camp. Now as schools try to reopen and people reclaim their private property, many people have to move to larger camps outside of Port-au-Prince. Albeit a necessary transition, there is a lot of confusion and despair in the process. Many have to be forcibly relocated. So we are going to observe the relocation of people from a nearby hospital this morning.

Three people went to Latiboliere to meet with Pe Dante. The village committee reported that there were about fifteen people in the area who had died during the quake, that about 100 homes were either badly damaged or destroyed, and that the general region had received about 1300 families who had fled from Port-au-Prince. They expressed concern that this not only stressed the housing needs in the area, but also put a lot of psychological pressure on many people subsequent to the quake. It appears that the sewing school was one of the few church buildings significantly damaged by the quake, but the damage involved only one wall, and does not appear to compromise the overall structural integrity of the building. They are in need of medical supplies and would appreciate any medical support from us moving forward (expressing a desire for doctors to visit and a desire to help work with the nurses in the clinic to build a health care center).

Bread for the World

During the weekend of May 22 and May 23, we will once again write letters to our two senators and Congressman Ryan under the auspices of "Bread for the World." We will urge Congress to take steps toward the goal of ending childhood hunger in the United States. We will also press for tax policies that help low-income families make ends meet and feed their children.

One of the tax policies that Congress will be considering is whether or not to renew the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), the only provision in the U.S. tax code targeted to low-income people. In 2009, the EITC lifted 6.6 million people, including 3.3 million children, above the federal poverty line.

The EITC helps low-income families work their way out of poverty and helps prevent families that have fallen into poverty from becoming trapped there. A study by two tax experts found that more than 60 percent of the families who file for the EITC do so for only one or two years at a time. The tendency of families to participate in EITC intermittently means that in the long run, they contribute far more in taxes than they receive in EITC refunds. Congress should protect and strengthen the EITC because it helps low-income workers build a stable financial future. Please take the time - it won't cost you a dime - to stop at one of our tables in the narthex to sign letters to our congressional representatives on May 22 or May 23. Thank you! The Social Ministry Team.
