### The Pulse of Our Mission: Catholic Social Teaching

One of the best overview primers on Catholic Social thought which I have found is a book called **Living Justice** by Thomas Massaro, S.J. (Sheed and Ward, 2000). This power-packed text reads simply and clearly about the Church's journey through the human struggles with peace and justice issues. Going back to the first encyclical written by Pope Leo XIII (Rerum Novarum), Massaro helps the reader catch a glimpse of the efforts the church has made to uphold the dignity of the human person, the rights of workers, war and disarmament, economic development, option for the poor and other key themes.

Last week I was given the assignment to put together a bibliography for the Parish Council on social thought, some of its members desiring to understand further Catholic Social issues. I thought if some are asking, then perhaps others are interested. Try out the book and see what you think. If along the way, you would like to get together to talk about what you have read, let me know. Perhaps we can discover more about it together.

## Men's Spirituality: Quest for the Male Soul

The Fourth in a Series on Men's Spirituality will be held on Saturday, **June 5 at 9:30 am in Room 312**. Fr. Martin Pable, OFM, Capuchin will continue his talks on male development and spiritual growth. This session will focus on "The Warrior Man: Choosing Your Battles". The warrior man puts his strength and courage at the service of God and humankind. Robert Hicks in his book, **The Masculine Journey**, says "The challenge of being a warrior is two-fold: knowing what to fight for, and knowing when to quit.... We certainly need warriors for the truth, to fight for the spiritual values in our society before they become extinct. But we also see many who war needlessly, or war for causes that are far removed from the category of 'worth dying for'" (Hicks 1993, 95).

Come, be among the many men in the parish who are growing in understanding their place in society as they are marked by Christ through baptism.

## Praise to the Creator

The first reading, from Proverbs, is a beautiful doxology of the glory of Christ, who existed before all of creation. Christ is the Wisdom of God spoken of in the verse: "from of old I was poured forth, / at the first, before the earth" (Proverbs 8:23). Christ is described in terms of preexistence, of knowledge and wisdom of God, as the Child of God in whom the Creator delights, playing on the earth and delighting in the human race. Psalm 8 continues this hymn of praise to the Creator, enumerating all the wonders of creation, and marveling at the wonderful truth that God has put humanity at the forefront of it all, making us a little less than angels, "crowned with glory and honor" (Psalm 8:6). © Copyright, J. ## Took, Blessed, Broke, Gave

Took, blessed, broke, gave. Those are the four actions Jesus repeats both here and at the Last Supper. They spell out the activity of our Eucharist, as well as our call to be food for a hungry world.

Took and broke are both aggressive, even violent words. They remind us that Jesus was taken, and broken; what we commemorate at our table is not a gentle story. Blessed and gave are both words of generosity. They remind us that our dinner is a celebration, a party where gifts are given and each member is honored. There is cause for rejoicing here.

Curious, though, how the blessing comes after the taking; how the sharing follows the breaking. The violence is mixed in with the gladness, and sorrow penetrates the celebration. Unless the bread is broken, you cannot have the sharing. In the same way, we come to understand that until we are willing to be taken, we cannot know the fullness of the blessing that awaits us. And unless we are prepared to be broken, we cannot give ourselves entirely to the mission that is ours. *God's Word is Alive* by Alice Camille, ACTA Publications, 5559 W. ### **Bread for the World - Writing of Letters**

This year's "Offering of Letters" campaign on behalf of Bread for the World was a great success. Over 350 letters were signed and forwarded to our Congressional leaders. We are grateful to all those who participated. By signing those letters, you showed your concern by asking Congress to help stamp out childhood hunger in our country.

**Thank you** to all the organizers and workers who helped package for our sister parish in Latiboliere, Haiti last weekend. We put our hands and hearts together to package over 45,000 meals. WOW! Our community inspires hope!

### **Update from Catholic Relief Services Haiti and Children**

June 1 is International Children's Day, a day when the world turns its attention to the health and welfare of children around the world. Catholic Relief Services keeps much of its focus on children every day, and in Haiti we've been working for fifty years to make the lives of children better.

Before the earthquake, CRS Haiti provided food and support to more than 100 orphanages and child-care centers in Port-au-Prince and Les Cayes. In the weeks after the quake, CRS brought food, water, hygiene kits, child-care materials and counseling support to affected centers. CRS protection teams established "child-safe spaces" - with large tents, recreational and educational materials, and trained staff and volunteers - in the sprawling urban settlements and tented cities. These spaces kept children active and safe while schools were closed. Over the last two weeks, an average of 1,075 children attended the child-friendly spaces each week. CRS teams are also registering unaccompanied children and helping with family reunification efforts. In the long term, we will continue to support vulnerable children and families, especially orphans, unaccompanied minors and displaced people, to help prevent child trafficking and dangerous border crossings.

Thank you for your prayers and partnership in our work to help the Haitian people in their recovery. By supporting CRS programs that empower Haitian communities to build back better, you are giving Haitian families the means to not only survive this catastrophe, but to thrive.
