Did you know that the Church dedicates each month of the year to a different mystery of our faith? You probably are aware of the Marian months, May and October, those are pretty popular. The others are as follows:

January – the Holy Name of Jesus February – the Passion March – St. Joseph April – the Resurrection May – the Blessed Virgin Mary June – the Sacred Heart July – the Precious Blood August – the Assumption September – the Holy Cross October – the Rosary November – the Poor Souls December - Advent

In this month of June, we celebrate two important solemnities. One is the Sacred Heart of Jesus on June 7<sup>th</sup> and the other is Corpus Christi on June 2<sup>nd</sup>. It was the love that pours from Jesus' Sacred Heart that caused Him to give us the gift of the Eucharist. For the past three years, we have been in a National Eucharist Revival. Also, the altar from our previous church has been placed in the chapel with two new icons, one of Our Lady of the Assumption and the other of St. Joseph the Worker. That chapel will still remain a beautiful place of prayer under the name Our Lady of the Assumption Chapel. I wish to offer my sincere thanks to all staff and volunteers who assisted in making this transition possible.

As we enter into these summer months they are typically time for some rest and relaxation. As we do so, we must remember that our true nourishment comes from the Body and Blood of Christ. Our sense of peace comes from the love of the Sacred Heart. These mysteries are what give life to us and to the Church. Let our hearts be full of gratitude!
