### Liturgy

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is the heart of our parish life, the source and summit of all we do. Each weekend we gather as one community to give praise and thanksgiving, strengthened for the week ahead. We are blessed to also celebrate daily Mass, where Christ nourishes us each day.

This past year brought many graces in worship and music, including a Children's Choir of 45 voices on Christmas Eve and our First Annual Outdoor Festival Mass, where more than 500 parishioners and friends gathered under the big tent.

The Holy Spirit is present not only in the Mass but in parish prayer and devotion: Be Still and Know, May Crowning, Corpus Christi, Divine Mercy, and Eucharistic Adoration. With grateful hearts, we recognize that all we have accomplished is because of God and offered back to Him **for His glory**.

### Discipleship

The themes of Invitation and Growth stand out in our Discipleship offerings for 2024–25. Our Discipleship Commission launched a Christmas Card Initiative, mailing nearly 4,000 invitations to area residents and encouraging parishioners to personally invite friends and neighbors. This effort led to a dramatic rise in Christmas Mass attendance, with continued growth in Mass participation, new members, and discipleship offerings. Plans are underway to expand this evangelization at Christmas and Easter.

Family Formation has also grown, with parents sharing that they joined St. Mary to renew their faith alongside their children. Many are rediscovering their faith and leading their families at home.

Teen and young adult discipleship is thriving as more youth celebrate Confirmation, return to parish activities, and attend the Steubenville Youth Conference. Young adults are also engaging in scripture studies and parish life.

### Pastoral Care

Our four core ministries of Prayer, Anointing, Communion, and Funeral are carried by 58 dedicated ministers. The Prayer Shawl Ministry and regular Intercessory Prayer gatherings offer comfort and support, while the Sacrament of Anointing is offered monthly and individually as needed. Ministers bring Communion to care centers, hospitals, and the homebound, aided by new Notebird software that improves communication. Grounded in humility, simplicity, friendship, and joy, we continue to serve God's people through Word, Sacrament, and Service.

#### Human Concerns

The Human Concerns Commission lived out Christ-centered service through prayer, generosity, and partnerships. Despite unrest in Haiti, aid continues to reach our sister parish in Latiboliere, parishioners supported the Circle of Love and Lenten drives, and local ministries were strengthened. St. Vincent de Paul welcomed 31 new volunteers, expanded outreach, and improved pantry operations to share Christ's love with those in need.

## St. Mary Parish School

St. Mary School is fully accredited by the Wisconsin Religious and Independent Schools Association and has received **Exemplary Recognition** from the Archdiocese of Milwaukee for excellence in Mission and Catholic Identity. For seven years, we have been recognized as a Distinguished Project Lead the Way School, one of only **45** elementary schools in Wisconsin with this honor.

Two \$25,000 Love One Another Grants, together with parishioner generosity and Royal Affair donations, funded a research-based reading and writing program and new interactive classroom displays. All middle school students are now equipped with one-to-one Chromebooks to support safe, effective learning.

Rooted in **faith and service**, our Outreach Ministry Partnerships connect each grade with meaningful service, including Haiti Mission, St. Ben's Meal Program, Nia Imani, Pathfinders, Kinship, and Repairers of the Breach, with Student Council supporting the St. Vincent de Paul Society.







### Annual Report - June 30, 2025

We are pleased to report that the parish has achieved its sixth consecutive year of meeting budget, closing the 2025 fiscal year with a net operating income of \$10,105. While this positive result reflects continued fiscal discipline and stewardship, it's important to recognize the underlying factors that contributed to the outcome and the financial challenges that remain ahead.

The 2025 budget was built with the expectation of increased offertory and giving, which would support the addition of two new parish staff positions: an Associate Pastor and a Director of Communications. However, neither position was filled during the fiscal year, and offertory revenue did not increase as projected. As a result, while we successfully met budget, this was due in large part to unfilled staffing costs, not increased revenue. This distinction is critical as we look to future sustainability.

Additionally, the school's enrollment came in below expectations, with 385 students enrolled versus the budgeted 410. This shortfall in enrollment resulted in lower tuition revenue than projected. While our operating income remains positive, this trend highlights the need for continued attention to enrollment strategy and retention efforts.

It's worth noting that several important initiatives took place outside of the operating budget. Thanks to the generosity of our community and successful fundraising efforts—including the Royal Affair and grant funding—we were able to upgrade interactive classroom technology across the school. Similarly, progress continues on various Love One Another campaign projects, which are improving our parish campus and infrastructure.

Looking ahead to the 2026 fiscal year, we will be working with the Archdiocese Stewardship Office to enhance our monthly offertory giving, which remains our most critical and substantial source of funding. We must also acknowledge the ongoing impact of inflation, which continues to erode our purchasing power. Simply cutting expenses is no longer a viable solution, as it limits our ability to meet essential fixed costs, such as building maintenance, wages, benefits, insurance, utilities, and other operational commitments. We are committed to avoiding a return to deferred maintenance, which in past years led to costly long-term consequences. Careful spending will always be our priority, but we must also be realistic and proactive in planning for the future needs of our parish and school.

As we move into the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, we have submitted a deficit budget due to the continued rise in operating costs and flat revenue trends. Unlike the previous year's budget, which was built with the assumption of offertory growth that ultimately did not materialize, the 2026 budget is based on historic giving levels with no assumed revenue increases. This conservative approach is fiscally responsible but highlights the structural imbalance we face if revenue remains stagnant. While the submitted budget reflects a prudent view of our current financial reality, it also paints a concerning picture of our needs going forward. Through strong stewardship, careful expense management, and a successful expanded offertory effort, we are hopeful that actual performance will exceed the budget and better position us to grow the parish and expand its capacity to support our ministry.
